# First Annual Alumni Golf Scramble Raises \$5,000 for Scholarship Fund

The first Friday of last August dawned warm and sunny, a good omen for the opening gun of the first annual Marlington Fun Scramble. Over seventy alumni and friends of Marlington arrived at Tannenhauf Golf Club in time to enjoy a breakfast buffet in the rustic clubhouse before tee off.

Sixteen four-somes lined up for a shotgun start, followed by good-natured competition and ribbing as the golfers worked their way around the eighteen hole course. Prizes were awarded for a number of achievements, including long drives, ball closest to pin, individual low score, team score, etc. Following the golf tournament, players wrapped up the day with a steak fry at the clubhouse. Mel Snode, longtime Marlington guidance counselor, served as chief grill-meister. Each player also received a souvenir logo t-shirt and a gift bag containing golf balls, tees, and other golfing supplies.



#### The Honor Class of 1947

The golden class honored by the Marlington Alumni Association this year had 33 members when graduation rolled around on May 26, 1948, as compared to the 254 seniors pictured in the silver anniversary class yearbook. Here some highlights of the high school careers from the two classes.

Officers for the graduating class of 1948 were Malden Sledden, president; Robert Michel, vice-president; Esther Frank, treasurer; and Sally Henson, secretary. The class sponsored dances for Thanksgiving and St. Patrick's Day, presented the three-act comedy *Miss Jimmy*, and wrapped up the social season by being guests of the junior class at the prom, held at the Alliance Country Club.

Senior bandsmen remember scattered boos from other students in the grandstand when they appeared at the Stark County Fair. Those jeers turned to cheers when it was announced that the orange and black clad bandsmen were from Marlboro High School, not the despised Massillon Tigers.

The class watched the football team compile a 4-3 record, with an impressive 47-2 victory over archrival Hartville for a big homecoming game. The basketball team was not quite as successful, finishing the 1948 season with a 6-9 record.

Subzero weather in January caused the seniors to miss a half-dozen days of school, none of them lamented. It was a year marked by appearances at the Farmer's Institute and Grange, a special week set aside for courtesy, and an unusual dance in which rags and burlap were the preferred order of dress.

#### The Honor Class of 1973

The Class of 1973 chose Marsha Helsel, president; Dave Wallace, vice-president; Patty Rosler, secretary; and Dave Gabric, treasurer. Science teacher Paul Elsass served as class sponsor.

Judy Breit, who was crowned Homecoming Duchess as a junior, did the honors for new duchess Sue Weedling, while Diana Byers reigned as winter sports queen at the "Snowball Fantasy." The theme of the junior senior prom was "Color My World;" Mary Frank was chosen as prom queen.

It was a less then successful year for athletics, with the football team winning only once in 10 tries, while the basketball team finished 6-12. Wrestling finished with a split season. Spring provided more wins than losses however, giving the sports scene a positive tone. The track team, coached by Howard Kitzmiller, finished with a 9-1 record.

The school year marked two new additions to extracurricular life: the start of a photography club to encourage and develop budding shutterbugs, and the debut of *Tapestry*, a school magazine to showcase student writing, photography, and art work.
