Golf Scramble Announced

Area golfers will have an opportunity to showcase their skills and win prizes at the fourth annual Marlington Fun Scramble golf event on July 21. At the same time, alumni duffers can provide financial support for the Marlington Alumni Association scholarship fund. The benefit event will be held at Tannenhaut Golf Course, with Bob Haines ('45) and Don Prather ('52) as co-chairmen.

The 1999 event brought more than \$7,000 into the Alumni Association scholarship fund, a big jump from the \$5,000 raised the previous year. Sponsorships increased from 23 to 41 and the number of participants increased to 85 players. Haines, who chaired the event last year, lauded Alliance auto dealer Mark Henschen, who provided use of a new car and a \$1,000 prize for a hole-in-one on designated holes, for his outstanding support of the program. All golf outing profits will go to the Alumni Association scholarship fund. Golfers can secure an IRS statement for declaring the amount of tax deduction from the entry fee at the course.

Play will begin with a shotgun start at 9 a.m. Greens fees, use of a power cart, an 8:00 a.m. buffet breakfast, and steak dinner at the end of play are included in the \$75 cost of the outing. In addition, each participant will receive a gift package of golfing accessories. There will also be various prizes awarded during play. Door prizes will be distributed at the dinner, prepared under the supervision of Trudy Porter, with retired Marlington guidance counselor Mel Snode as grillmaster. The format is four-member teams. Individuals are also invited to participate and will be assigned teams at the course.

Bob Haines & Jack Chenevey Receive Top Alumni Awards

Outstanding Alumni Awards for 1999 were presented to Robert Haines ('45) and Navy Rear Admiral Jack Chenevey ('65) at the Marlinton Alumni Association annual banquet. The selection of both honorees was based on career achievement. Haines' career experience included work at B & W Tubular, Goodyear Wingfoot, and Morgan Engineering. In 1954 he joined the Quickdraft Corporation in Canton, a manufacturer of pneumatic materials handling systems for the paper, foil, textile, and metal industries. Haines served as plant superintendent, vice president, and on the board of directors, being named president in 1969 and retiring in 1992.

Adm. Chenevey is currently the assistant commander of Naval Aviation Systems Command for Logistics/Industrial Operations, directing the maintenance of over 4,500 naval aircraft. During his career as a naval aviator, he has flown the A-7E Corsair II, A-7F, and F-18 Hornet. Chenevey has served tours of duty in the Mediterranean, the western Pacific, and the Indian Ocean, being assigned at various times to flight squadrons on the *USS Independence*, *USS Ranger*, and *USS Constellation*. Chenevey also completed assignments as a HARM missile project officer and as military director of the Weapons Directorate.

Gordon Rinehart is Fine Example of Role Model

There's no dictionary entry for the term "role model." You have to look up each word and generate your own phrase. If the dictionary experts ever decide to come up with a succinct, accurate description for that phrase, however, it can be done in two words: Gordon Rinehart. He is a man whose examples and lifestyle are well worth imitating at any age level.

As a student, his grades were exemplary. Rinehart was high school salutatorian and a *magna cum laude* college graduate. He also compiled an enviable attendance record, never missing a day of public school or college. His standards as an educator garnered him the Alliance High School Teacher of the Year award in 1967, the Phi Delta Kappa Educator of the Year award in 1981, and the Lexington Ruritan Club Professional Man of the Year award in 1985. That just scratches the surface of honors and commendations he has received through the years.

As a citizen, he's been active as a member of the Salvation Army Advisory Board, involved in many Masonic groups (he was elected a 33rd degree mason in 1977), served in the U.S. Navy Construction Battalion during World War II, and is a member of the American Legion. His strong religious faith is put in practice with daily prayer, involvement in the Science Hill United Church of Christ, and unwavering trust in God. He has been described by colleagues as the good humor man for his perpetual smile and positive attitude. He can, and usually does, crack a joke on any subject at the drop of a hat.

Born near Morgantown, WV, Rinehart walked two miles along a hilly dirt road to catch a bus for the ten-mile ride to school. "I was raised in a Christian home," he reflects. His parents taught school, although his father was primarily a farmer, and Rinehart deems himself fortunate to have been influenced by the importance of Christianity and education.

His stint with the Seabees during World War II included construction projects in the Hawaiian Islands and Saipan. He returned to Ohio and employment at

Timken Roller Bearing and Republic Steel Corp before utilizing the GI Bill to attend Glenville (WV) State College. He got a master's degree from the University of West Virginia and has done post graduate work at Cornell, Kent State, Marshall, Ohio, Ohio Wesleyan, Western Reserve, and Dayton universities.

He has teaching majors in physics, mathematics, and comprehensive science. He initially planned to work in the chemistry department of a West Virginia firm, but was encouraged to try teaching mathematics at Ravenswood (WV) High School. Industry lost a potential chemist and education gained a teacher, administrator and leader. Rinehart was visiting his sister in Louisville when he learned of a teaching vacancy in the Alliance school system. He applied, got a contract in the mail and the rest, as they say, is history. He came to Alliance in 1952, teaching mathematics at B.F. Stanton Junior High School for five years, then teaching physics and mathematics for thirteen years at Alliance High School. He was named a Jennings Scholar in 1967.

During his classroom years, he felt he could be a successful administrator, and in typical fashion began preparing by completing administrative training at Kent. When the assistant principal's job was offered at Marlinton High School, he made the switch. Three years later he was named principal, a post he held until retirement in 1986. The school newspaper, *The Shield*, called him a man of "service, dedication, encouragement, and open generosity," noting that "Mr. Rinehart would like to be remembered as a man whose door was always open to all . . . as a positive guy and as a leader, not a pusher."

Typically, his final message to seniors that year was upbeat and positive. He wrote, "...we thank you for contributing to a history of success. We salute you for having made an addition to the rich heritage of this school. You have been involved in a never-ending procession...leaving behind something worthwhile to each future class. This school has benefited from your presence here. May your success in the future prove that you have benefited by being a part of this school. We hope that you have learned to handle responsibilities, to serve, to get along with people, and graduate from this school with the feeling that it is a better place because you were here."

Retirement didn't mean a rocking chair for Rinehart. He has been a frequent speaker for school, service, veteran and church activities. His emphasis is upon the things which are good, on patriotism and

faith. "God has been good to me," he says. "I like to give him thanks." His West Virginia roots resulted in a number of church homecoming events in that state, while his musical talents have resulted in numerous engagements, either with the Ramblers, a Masonic men's group, or with his daughter, Marsha Graham, Marlinton High School teacher and guidance counselor. Rinehart and wife Mary Jane divide their time between the Carnation City and Naples, Florida. His first wife, Dorothy, died in 1982, after 36 years of marriage. His second wife, Helen, died in 1992.

The walls of his study in Alliance are lined with citations, awards and pictures. He has letters of praise and commendation from former administrators, associates, and students. Former Marlinton Supt. Dr. James Akenhead lauded Rinehart's commitment to never be satisfied with "good enough" and for his pride in and support of the district. A student from his

Ravenswood High School teaching days, now professor of mathematics at Denison University, credits Rinehart as the mathematics teacher who first inspired him to think of teaching as a profession. The examples go on and on.

Rinehart feels the education offered students today does a good job preparing them for the technical world in which they live. He is, however, concerned that discipline has been taken from the schools and that teachers' hands are tied by the litigatory process which has become so prevalent. "I shudder to think that Christ is taken from the school," he says, "and that students are given condoms instead. How can we expect young people to be respectful and treat others with respect if their leaders aren't doing what they should?" he asks, adding, "Where are young people's role models?" That last question was easy. It just required a look in the mirror.

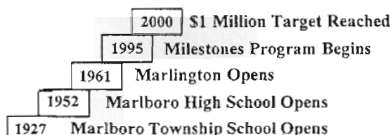

The Honor Class of 1950

This year's golden anniversary class chose "Up the steps, over the threshold and into the world" as a motto, with red and white carnations the class flower. Scarlet and gray were the class colors. Serving as class officers for the final year of high school were James Ward, president; Francis Prather, vice president; Joan Mori, secretary and Betty Enoch, treasurer, a post she held all four years in high school.

They were under the watchful eye of faculty advisor Harry Dutka, who coached all four sports and whose football team finished the year 6-0-2. That team was unscored upon in league play and finished as county co-champions after a 6-6 playoff tie with Middlebranch after the regular season ended. A half dozen members of the class were members of that team: James Ward, Francis Prather, Ernest Walker, Charles Michel, George Snyder, and Ray Green.

Joan Mori was Homecoming Queen that year. The seniors presented the play *A Case of Springtime* and were guests of the junior class at the Mayflower Hotel in Akron for prom. Senior academic honors went to Elinor Wearstler, James Ward, Betty Enoch, Betty Candle, Virginia Valentine, and Nancy Ring. From the time school began September 7, until baccalaureate May 21 and commencement May 24, the class was busy providing leadership in athletics, scholarship, and extra curricular activities.

The Honor Class of 1975

Our silver honoree class had the motto "Look to the future, for the future is ours," with Ben Spalding serving as president, Steve Fleischer—vice president; Lesa Rummell—secretary, and Tina Tasker—treasurer. The class, which selected the yellow rose as class flower and blue/silver for class colors, sponsored such activities as the Winter Sports Dance, an all-school talent show, and a trip to Washington, D.C., under the faculty sponsorship of Bruce Markham. Their senior year saw formation of a chess club, Federal League championship in track and co-championship in golf, and the start of girls volleyball and tennis programs. Senior MVP recipients were Mark Ulbricht in football and Rick Snode in golf.
